West Covina City Council Approves \$5 Million for Street Improvements

he West Covina City Council has approved \$5 million in street rehabilitation projects that will be totally paid with restricted funding.

There will be no General Fund monies used to finance these improvements. A significant portion of the projects will be funded by Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant funds.

The work will provide improvements to major streets as well as residential streets throughout the

city.

The City's Pavement Management System selected the streets involved in the projects. This computerized system tracks street conditions and reports the type and urgency of street repair needed.

A portion of the improvements will include leftturn traffic signal installations at Sunset Avenue at Puente Avenue, Lark Ellen Avenue at Puente Avenue, and Nogales Street at Amanda Avenue.


Don't Forget to 'Treecycle!'

Due to the leadership of the City Council, dedication of city staff, partnerships with local, regional, state and federal agencies, and community involvement, the

City has converted one of the largest landfills into a nationally recognized, thriving attraction and opened the project to more grant funding.

Future plans include a 5.8-acre corporate office development, an 18-hole championship golf course and multipurpose recreational trails.

In earning these two awards, the City received its 13th prestigious award for the West Covina Commercial Center and Big League Dreams Sportsplex project.

Senior Tenter Earns Site Award

The West Covina Senior Center, located at 2501 E. Cortez St., has been honored with the "Distinguished Site Award" from the Los Angeles County Area Agency on Aging.

WHAT CAN I DO ABOUT THAT BARKING DOG?

1. Send a letter, with the address of the animal owner and a brief description of the complaint, to: County of Los Angeles Department of Animal Care and Control

Center, 4275 N. Elton St., Baldwin Park, CA 91706.

- 2. Animal Control will send a formal "Notice of Abatement" to the animal owner, who will then have seven days to correct the public nuisance.
 - 3. If the nuisance continues, an officer is sent out to abate the nuisance.
- 4. Then, if the problem is not resolved, it is submitted to the Department of Consumer Affairs for mediation, as a free service to you.
 - 5. If mediation fails, it may lead to legal action to resolve the matter.

INCREASED TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT ON THE WAY

Thanks to Grant Funding

afer streets and increased traffic enforcement are coming to the City, as the West Covina Police Department recently started a Selective Traffic Enforcement Program. The \$45,737 in grant funds will be used for focusing on traffic safety problems and reducing the number of persons killed and injured in traffic collisions, specifically targeting alcohol offenders, red light runners, speeders, problematic intersections, motorcycle safety and more.

"Over the next 12 months, this program will provide West Covina additional resources to target a range of traffic issues," West Covina Police Chief Frank Wills said.

West Covina officers will pay special attention to motorcyclists, as motorcycle fatalities have been on the rise in California, increasing 175 percent statewide in the last decade.

"Every driver and every motorcyclist must get back to the basics: drive sober, always drive or ride safely, buckle up and we will save lives. It's just that simple," said Christopher J. Murphy,

director of the California Office of Traffic Safety. "This grant will help make West Covina just that much safer of a place to live and work."

WEST COVINA SELECTED FOR GRANT FUNDING FROM OVER 3,500 APPLICANTS!

Funds to Be Used for Increased Police Services

The City of West Covina Police Department has successfully obtained a nationally competitive \$255,831 Recovery Act Edward Byrne Competitive Grant from the U.S. Department of Justice to hire two civilian law enforcement support personnel, specifically a community service officer (CSO) and a dispatcher.

"The U.S. Department of Justice received 3,578 applications under eight funding categories of these grants, and they only approved 3.3 percent of them," said Police Administrative Services Manager Alex Houston. "This was a highly competitive grant, funded by the Recovery Act to retain jobs that directly support sworn police officers. Grants like this allow the police department to meet specific safety needs without increasing costs, which is especially important in this climate of financial challenge."

This grant, which lasts about two years, will fund the CSO to monitor streets and respond to calls for service that do not require sworn police officers, and fund the dispatcher to answer and dispatch emergency calls to patrol officers.

Additionally, the police department was recently awarded another U.S. Department of Justice grant, a \$165,998 Recovery Act Justice Assistance Grant, which funds special bulletproof vests, less-lethal weapons and accessories, computers for communications with field officers, two vehicles for detectives, radios for motorcycle officers and overtime enforcement at the City's commercial areas.

"Grants are very important to the police department, as they provide resources needed to address significant public safety needs," Police Chief Frank Wills said.

Offers Two New City Services

Two new services have been added to improve the ability of community members to connect with the West Covina Police Department.

The first service allows you to use your cell phone to send an anonymous tip via text message. Simply text the word "TIPWCPD" along with your tip to TIP411 (847411).

The second new service will make it more convenient for those involved in traffic accidents. If you need to obtain a traffic accident report that



occurred after September 2009, you can now visit the West Covina Police Department Web site, www.wcpd.org, or go directly to http://westcovinaca.policereports.us/ to obtain the report. To search for an accident report, you will need either a report number and a last name, or a report date and a last name.

To download copies of reports, you need to have a computer,

a printer, Internet access and a credit card to purchase the report. The fee for the service is \$2.50, which goes to the company for offering the service. This allows individuals, their attorneys and insurance companies the flexibility of getting the reports online, 24 hours a day.
