# TWO STATE AWARDS

The City of West Covina Community Services Department received an Achievement Award from the California Park and Recreation Society for its efforts to comply with the Gender Equity Legislation, also known as AB 2404.

The legislation, which became

effective in January 2005, is intended to ensure that government agencies provide equitable opportunities for girls and boys to participate in community athletics.

In addition, the City of West Covina also received the Award of Excellence for the West Covina Big League Dreams project, which underscored the value of converting a landfill to a public recreational space.

"The CPRS awards program is the highest recognition our agency can receive, and it's an honor to be recognized among the hundreds of outstanding parks and recreation departments throughout California," Community Services Director Michele McNeill said.

The California Park and Recreation Society is a membership organization with 4,200 members

representing the 525 local parks and

recreation agencies throughout the state. The mission of CPRS is to provide the leadership and resources to promote

the role of parks and recreation in creating community through people, parks and programs.





# West Covina Police Get Results in Fight Against Graffiti

In 2006, the West Covina Police Department formed a four-man Graffiti Abatement Team (GAT).

The GAT team currently consists of Cpl. Ron Allen and officers Jeff Mosley, Ken Block and Matt Nelson. They focused their attention on analyzing graffiti; identifying tagging crews, gangs and individual taggers responsible for graffiti in West Covina; and making arrests for these crimes.

This past October, the police department purchased Graffiti Tracker software to help keep track of the graffiti that was removed. Graffiti Tracker is a wonderful tool that's like having an additional crime analyst at a fraction of the cost.

Twelve days into implementing the software, GAT made its first arrest by utilizing Graffiti Tracker. In the last two and half months of 2008, GAT made



25 arrests with the help of Graffiti Tracker. In the first three months of 2009, GAT has made 55 arrests with the help of Graffiti Tracker.

A few years ago, the City started the Graffiti Rewards Program, which has been very successful. In 2008, the department paid out \$4,600 to residents who called in with graffiti reports that resulted in an arrest. For Graffiti Rewards Program details, call (626) 939-8503. - In 2006, GAT made 146 graffiti-related arrests, and in 2007 GAT made 228 graffiti-related arrests.
- In 2008, GAT made 318 graffiti related arrests. The rest of the police department made 109 graffiti-related arrests, for a total of 427 graffiti-related arrests in 2008.
- Of the 427 graffiti-related arrests, 144 were adults and 283 were juveniles.
- Of the 144 adults arrested, there were 82 felonies and 62 misdemeanors.
- Of the 283 juveniles arrested, there were 116 felonies and 167 misdemeanors
- In the first three months of 2009, GAT has made a total of 84 graffiti arrests.

# Farmers Market Brings Fresh Produce to West Covina

Every Saturday, the West Covina Farmers Market offers a seasonal variety of fresh fruits and vegetables, hummus, fresh bakery goods, kettle corn, tacos, tamales and Sweet Lou's specially blended spices. An Asian selection of vegetables is available every other week.

"All fruits and vegetables available at the Farmers Market are grown in California," Manager Roger Evans said. "They contain no preservatives or harmful pesticides, and they are grown with safe fertilizers, as regulated by the State of California."

The Senior Services Volunteer of the Year Award is presented to an individual to recognize achievements and dedication for outstanding volunteer service efforts in activities that benefit senior citizens. Fleck is an active member of West Covina Beautiful, the Historical Society and the West Covina Library. As membership chairman of the Friends of the Library, Fleck promotes community awareness of the library and its programs.



#### **PUBLIC WORKS PROJECT UPDATES**

- A) Stamped Concrete Sidewalk Colored concrete sidewalks with a cobblestone pattern have been installed at Merlinda and Walnut Grove elementary schools. These high-traffic areas were unable to sustain landscaping. Funding for this project came from the California Department of Transportation.
- B) Glendora Business District Improvements at the Old Town Business District have been completed with seal coating and restriping of the parking lot. New benches, trash cans, trellises, handicap ramps, street lights and landscaping have helped give the area a fresh new look.
- C) Handicap Sidewalk Ramps In February, the City installed and modified roughly 80 handicap ramps on sidewalks throughout the community. This work was done to ensure these ramps comply with current accessibility code requirements. Funding for this project was obtained via Community Block Development Grants.

Lark Ellen Sewer Project – L.A. County Sanitation District's Lark Ellen sewer main project will be wrapping up soon. Grinding and final paving on Lark Ellen in the City of West Covina will be

completed this week. Raising of manholes, stripping and reinstallation of traffic loops should be completed by April 3. Work will continue until May or June north of San Bernardino Road on Lark Ellen outside the City.
