n Thursday, September 1, Westfield West Covina will host a grand opening ceremony that will commemorate the completion of the mall's Phase III development, which includes Nordstrom Rack, Gold's Gym, a new state-of-the-art Playspace and a new mall entrance.

Nordstrom Rack will also host its own grand opening festivities that same day, with the store opening at 9 a.m.

Nordstrom Rack and Gold's Gym will join a litany of new tenants at the mall, including XXI Forever, H&M, Foreign Exchange, Chronic Taco and Lee's Sandwiches.



In Southern California, it costs more to produce electricity in the summer, when energy demand is at its peak, and less to produce electricity in the winter, during periods of lower demand. When you use energy wisely, you'll be saving money and the environment.

That's why the City of West Covina and Southern California Edison (SCE) are partnering to encourage energy efficiency and conservation.

Using energy wisely in our everyday lives is a smart way to ensure our planet and its natural resources are protected. Simple changes to your daily routine on how and when you use electricity can make a difference.

For example, switch off unnecessary lights, and at the end of the day turn off office equipment. Even using your washing machine, dryer or dishwasher

before noon or after 6 p.m. can help conserve energy when demand is at its highest.

Energy management is the first and best way to manage your energy use not only at home, but at work, too. It can help create a brighter future for us all. By becoming more energy-conscious, you'll help California conserve valuable energy resources now and well into the future.













City of West Covina Earns Energy Efficiency Award

he City of West Covina is proud to lead by example in saving energy and money as a member of the San Gabriel Valley Energy Wise Partnership, an innovative partnership among 29 cities in the San Gabriel Valley, the San Gabriel Valley Council of Governments and Southern California Edison (SCE).

Through this partnership, the City of West Covina is one of only four cities in SCE's service territory to reach the "Gold Level" tier in SCE's Energy Leader Partnership Model. This noteworthy distinction is awarded only to select partner cities that meet ambitious energy-savings goals achieved through implementation of energy efficiency and demand response measures in both municipal and community facilities.

Through its active participation in SCE's Demand Response programs, the City of West Covina encourages community residents and local businesses to conserve during periods of peak energy use, which reduces demand for electricity and helps to

protect California's energy supply. In the City of West Covina, three facilities – a fire station, Cameron Park Community Center, and the City's maintenance offices – are enrolled in the Summer Discount Plan.

By enrolling in this program, which operates from June 1 to October 1, customers allow SCE to install a small, remote-controlled cycling device on their central air conditioner unit. If peak energy demand puts too much pressure on SCE's electricity system, such as on high-heat days, SCE will remotely cycle off the air conditioner's compressor. In exchange, the customer receives a credit on their electrical bill.

Participating customers have the ability to choose from a variety of options, which could include capping the length of time that the compressor is cycled off or the number of events that their facility participates in per summer. The amount of the credit varies by the enrollment selection.

Currently, the City's facilities are enrolled in the enhanced good value option, meaning that during events, the City's air conditioners are cycled off for 15 minutes out of every 30 minutes (50 percent), and there is not a limit on the number of events that may occur. Just by enrolling in this program, the City has saved an estimated \$175 through July of this year.

"This program was simple to enroll in and had minimal impact on our operations," said Director of Public Works Shannon Yauchzee. "The various enrollment options allow you to customize the program to meet the needs of your facility."

SCE's Summer Discount Program is open to both business and residential customers. Business customers can save up to \$12 per ton of air conditioning per month, and residents can receive up to \$200 for enrollment during the summer.
