Homelessness is a crisis that impacts those who experience it, neighborhoods, businesses, and communities.

Homelessness is solvable.



What do we know about homelessness

Many people experiencing homelessness do not have significant challenges such as severe mental illness or substance use disorders. The majority are homeless because of economic issues specifically housing and the high cost of living. Only a portion of people face issues such as mental illness and substance use disorders, however they can be quite visible in public as many of those who struggle with these challenges are sleeping outside.

Only 30% of people in the San Gabriel Valley are considered **Chronically Homeless** meaning that they have lengthy homeless history and a disability.



72% of households assessed for housing and services in West Covina need limited short term financial assistance and support.

10% need very minimal assistance and should
be able to end their
homelessness on their own.

Nearly a quarter of the nation's homeless population is in California, with LA accounting for a large portion of that group



There are 4,292 people experiencing homelessness in the San Gabriel Valley with **277 living in West Covina** according to LAHSA's 2018 homeless count

How do we solve homelessness?


First we must believe that homelessness is a solvable problem.


According to the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness, 62 communities across the country including 3 states have ended Veteran homelessness demonstrating that it is solvable if we do the right things.

People become homeless for a variety of reasons but to solve it is fairly simple...

Housing and appropriate services.

Focus should be on figuring out how to get someone into housing quickly and provide the right amount of services to help them be successful in their place.





What is West Covina doing?

The City adopted a Homeless Plan to guide its efforts in addressing homelessness, which has a minimum time frame of three years.

LEADERSHIP

The City has committed to addressing homelessness and developed a comprehensive plan

OUTREACH AND ENGAGEMENT

The City funds the Police Department's Homeless Outreach and Park Enforcement (HOPE) Team, and dedicates staff time to the Homeless Assistance Liaison Officer (HALO) Team and Mental Evaluation Team (MET)

BASIC NEEDS

The City funds motel vouchers for emergency housing, coordinates with other agencies and churches for winter shelter sites, and provides funding for area food banks

COORDINATION

The City coordinates with stakeholders in West Covina such as the school district and universities, and regional partners such as neighboring cities and the County of Los Angeles non-profit organizations

RAPID RE-HOUSING

The City currently funds a Rapid Re-Housing Program and is considering enhancing this program as part of its Homeless Plan

What can you do to assist individuals and families to access housing and services?

The homeless Coordinated Entry System is the vehicle to assist individuals and families access housing and services based on their level of need in the San Gabriel Valley.

The first step for someone to take is to complete a specialized assessment. It is important to know where to tell people to go to start the process in addressing their homelessness.
