5) Volunteer of the Year Nominations Selection – Community Services & Recreation Services

Discussion was had about the nominations received for Community Services, Andres Castaneda and Suburban Water Systems, and a selection was made.

Motion by Kaufman and second by Lewis to select Andres Castaneda as the Volunteer of the Year Awardee for Community Services. Motion carried by a vote of 8-0 with 1 abstaining and 1 absent.

Recreation Services Nominee: No nominations were received.

Discussion was had about revisiting the criteria, making adjustments to the application, update the information for each category regarding prior awardees being eligible for nomination again, creating a list of prior awardees for future consideration and nominations and changing the timeline of the program to not coincide with the other entities Volunteer of the Year programs, to increase the number of nominations received for next year's application process. The only exception to changing the timeline would be the review of applications received for the Outstanding Older American Volunteer of the Year program as that is a Los Angeles County program.

All Commissioners agreed to direct staff to re-create and update criteria on the application for the 2020 volunteer of the year nomination process. Staff will do so.

6) Commissioner Kaufman requested the Commission recommend to the Council to send a letter to both the Los Angeles County Sheriff & Supervisor Hilda Solis's office that includes a detailed description of the process that Chicago is doing with their county inmate release program to help alleviate homelessness within their community.

Discussion was had about Chicago (Illinois) inmate release program that assists inmates with transiting back into society by offering temporary housing, food and job training assistance. Commissioner Lewis also stated that we should include Rhode Island's program that is not only a state wide program but has similarities to the Chicago program, within the letter for consideration as well. A request by Commissioner Kaufman for either city staff or a Commissioner to create a letter to present to Council for review and submittal to the Los Angeles County Sheriff & Supervisor Hilda Solis's offices to look into these programs and see how these programs could assist with the homelessness programs currently being created or updated within California and our community was presented for consideration.

Commissioner Stewart took a consensus of Commissioners and all in agreeance to direct Commissioner Kaufman to draft a letter to send to Nikole for review and presentation for Council's consideration.

7) Commissioner Zaklama requested an update on special event calendar in conjunction with infrastructure of the parks to hold special events. – Presented by Public Services Supervisor Mike Cresap

Discussion was had about the upcoming special events for the remainder of 2019 and events scheduled for 2020 as well as the infrastructure of city facilities and parks to hold larger scale special events. The subject of having, or creating amphitheaters or the like, for these types of events was discussed. However, due to limited space currently at facilities and parks, the logistics of larger scale events are not currently attainable at this time with the current infrastructure. Staff will include the implementation of special uses such as amphitheaters and the like in future projects that are planned through the Parks Needs Assessment process.

Discussion was had if Commissioners could assist the City with applying for grants for projects. Discussion regarding the process was given by Nikole and she welcomed the assistance from Commissioners to assist with the grant process and looks forward to working with those Commissioners that wish to participate in this process as well.

8) Facility Reports for February and March 2019

Discussion regarding the reports and numbers given. Statistics of Public Services Maintenance Division's work order status was requested by Commissioners to be placed with the facility usage reports to see the progress of work being completed by Staff and give a timeline of completion of requests. Staff will provide that documentation.

Discussion was had about the reports looking similar. Staff will verify numbers and bring back corrections to the report that are incorrect at the next meeting in July.

9) Update on Measure A Funding for Park Improvement – Presented by Assistant City Manager/Public Services Director Nikole Bresciani

Commissioners were provided with the last Park Needs Assessment listing and an updated fund allocation sheet to review during this presentation.

Discussion was had about the receipt of new funds from Measure A, the projects set to be done based on the grant funds that are allocated for the projects, as well as old projects and old funds that need to be completed before new projects can be started and funds utilized for these new projects. City Staff stated that they recently discovered through this year's Measure A process, that the City has approximately \$2 million in a fund within a holding account the County holds for the City, which needs to be used on old projects. Old projects must be completed and old funds used before new funding received can be used on new projects. Discussion was had on how to move forward with Measure A and a request by Commissioner Lewis to bring back this request at the next Commission meeting in July. Staff will bring back the request as the next meeting in July.

10) Update on Commissioner Kaufman's request that the Historical Society bust be displayed at a secure location at City Hall.

Discussion was had as to where in city hall the Historical Society's honorary bust could be displayed in a secure location but also accessible to the public for viewing. Nikole stated that the best location/city facility to meet these needs would be the City Manager's office if the Historical Society would be willing to display it there. Nikole stated the only other location she would suggest is maybe the Plaza at West Covina if they have a location available for their request. Commissioner Kaufman stated he will bring this information back to the Historical Society and see what their decision will be and bring an update back to the Staff.

11) Update on Commissioner Lewis's request for uses for the parcel at South Cameron & East Hills Drive. – Update was given by Assistant City Manager/Public Services Director Nikole Bresciani

Discussion was had regarding this property being a catch basin and the logistics in using this property for anything other than what it is currently being used for are unknown due to it being a catch basin location and the State and County regulations related to these types of use. At this time the City will not pursue any other use of this property due to these regulations.

PROPOSITION 68 FUNDING OPPORTUNITY

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

On June 5, 2018, the California Drought, Water, Parks, Climate, Coastal Protection, and Outdoor Access for All Act of 2018 (Prop 68) was approved with 56 percent of the vote to authorize the state to borrow \$4.1 billion for investments in outdoor recreation, land conservation and water projects. Prop 68 includes a Competitive and a Per Capita Program, which are applicable to West Covina.

The Competitive Program is intended to create new parks and new recreation opportunities in underserved communities across the state and the application deadline is August 5, 2019. To be eligible for the Competitive Program, a proposed project site can qualify in one of two ways:

Less than 3 park acres per 1,000 people

OR

Less that \$51,026 median household income

Using the required California State Parks Community FactFinder, which evaluates park space within, the proximity of a half-mile radius of the project site, staff determined the eligibility of the following asterisked (*) parks in the table below, based on the acreage criteria. All statewide applications will be evaluated on a points system for various criteria, including type of project, partnerships, community-based planning, employment or volunteer opportunities, park acres per 1,000 people median household income, and number below poverty.

Per Capita Program Funds will be available for local park rehabilitation, creation, and improvement grants to local governments on a per capita basis. Grant recipients are encouraged to utilize awards to rehabilitate existing infrastructure and to address deficiencies in neighborhoods lacking access to the outdoors. The release of a final procedural guide and announcement of allocations is expected to occur in late summer of 2019 according to the State Office of Grants and Local Services.

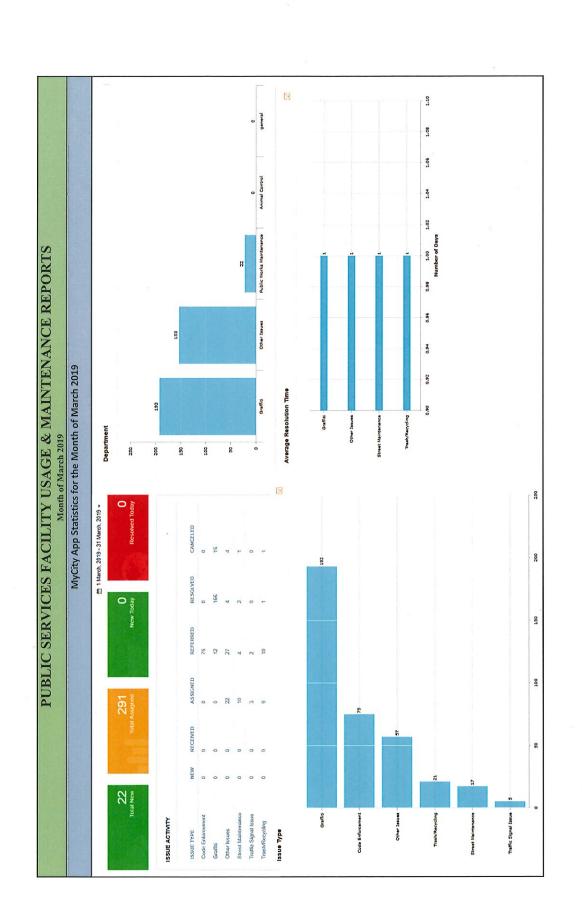

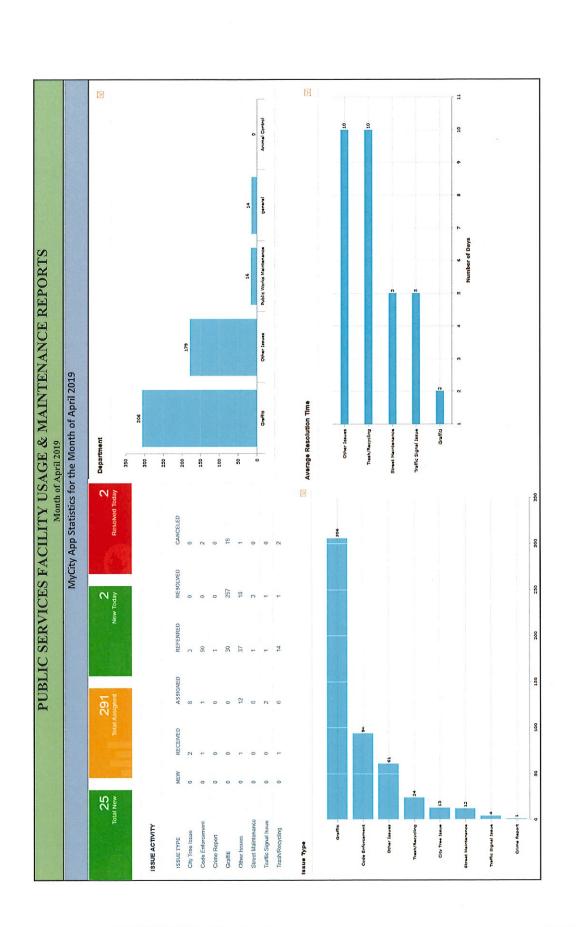

SUBJECT:

MEASURE A UPDATE - REQUEST BY COMMISSIONER LEWIS

RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that the Commission receive and file this informational report.

BACKGROUND:

The Safe Neighborhood Parks Propositions (Proposition A) of 1992 and 1996, which voters approved on November 3, 1992, and November 5, 1996, respectively, allocated a total of \$110 million to Cities and the County of Los Angeles on a per parcel basis. These funds were allocated proportionally to Cities and to the County (for unincorporated areas of the County) based on the number of parcels within each jurisdiction, as determined by the County Assessor. These Propositions (Old Park Bond) included the provision of Maintenance and Servicing (M&S) funds to eligible agencies to offset the increased maintenance costs resulting from Proposition-funded projects.

Measure A was a ballot initiative that was approved in November 2016 by a majority of Los Angeles County voters. The Measure added a 1/4 cents parcel tax to each Los Angeles County residential property, ensuring cities in Los Angeles County would get annual funding to add or improve park property and amenities. In addition to each City's pro rata share, there is a competitive grant program which allows cities to apply for funding for regional projects that impact communities in the region. Also, cities receive Maintenance and Servicing (M&S) funding to help maintain new or enhanced projects in perpetuity.

The difference with Measure A funding compared to Old Park Bond funding is that, Measure A has no sunset clause so there is no expiration date on the parcel tax being assessed. Funds pursuant to the 1992 Proposition were collected and set aside in Fiscal Year 1993-1994 through Fiscal Year 2014-2015. The collection and set aside funds available through the 1996 Proposition began in Fiscal Year 1997-1998 and extends through Fiscal Year 2018-2019. Old Park Bond M&S funding can only be used on projects already constructed (Attachment No. 1), but M&S funding from Measure A can be used on not only new projects but the ones funded under the Old Park Bond.

For West Covina, the total in assessments collected by the County between the Old Park Bonds is \$2.54 million. Interest in the amount of \$566,280 has accrued on the balance of the assessments since the start of the collection, for a total of \$3.1 million. Because the City has expended \$1.06 million of these funds on the maintenance of projects, the City currently has \$2.04 million in Old Park Bond M&S funding remaining in its County escrow account. The City is in the process of drawing down some of those funds (Attachment No. 2). The City cannot utilize new M&S funding until the City draws down its existing M&S funds, but that does not preclude the City from applying for funding for the installation of a new project. Staff estimates that it will be eighteen months to

two years before it will need to use the new M&S funds because a project still has to be completed with Measure A funding before we can tap into the new M&S funds to maintain the new project.

DISCUSSION:

The City of West Covina anticipates receiving an annual allocation of \$323,000 for new/improved park projects from Measure A and \$78,000 annually of M&S funding to maintain new projects or improvements. The funding cannot pay for programs like classes or new staff unless directly related to the improvement, like City staff who maintain the Splash Pad at Del Norte Park.

The City conducted two Park Needs Assessments, and each yielded different results (Attachment No. 3). Throughout the Park Needs Assessment meetings, staff expressed Council's priority in completing the lower plateau at Shadow Oak Park. That project included a parking lot, restroom and tot lot, which was estimated at over \$1 million when the design was completed in 2017. When staff bid the restroom project alone, those bids came in at over \$500,000, so it is advisable to bid the project as one package to be cost-effective. It was anticipated that the City would fund that project in part by Measure A, and the other funding was slated to come from Park Dedication Fees. Unless otherwise directed, the intention is to continue with Shadow Oak as the Community's priority project and then, as other funding comes in, projects will be selected off the list.

As the City has transitioned to Council-Districts, staff plans on having multiple community meetings to enable residents from each District to be heard on what projects they feel are important in their neighborhoods. The Community & Senior Services Commission Ad-hoc Committee for Capital Improvement Projects will be involved with the design elements and the Commission as a whole will make recommendations to the Council regarding projects after having received input from the community at-large.

Fiscal Impact

FISCAL IMPACT:

The City of West Covina will receive an annual allocation of Measure A of approximately \$323,000 for park improvements and \$75,000 annually for Maintenance & Servicing Funds to maintain new projects. Funds can be "banked" for up to five years to accumulate funding for bigger projects.
